Caroline served as officers in all of these clubs throughout her years.

Survivors include a daughter, Theresa Wittman of Topeka, KS; sisters, Maryann Rome of Golden, CO, Barbara Rome of Aurora, CO, Anges Rome of Aurora, CO, Shirley Kuppertz of Ellis, KS; seven grandchildren, thirteen great grandchildren, and three great-great grandchildren.

Caroline was preceded in death by her parents; husband; son, Eugene Wittman; daughter, Vicky Jensen; siblings, Bridget Mann, Luciene Horak, Adolph Billinger, John Billinger, Dorothy Fagan, Peter Billinger, Clara Herman, Louis Billinger, and Elaine Knoll.

A Memorial Mass of Christian Burial will be celebrated in July 2026, in her honor of her 100th birthday. Service details will be shared at a later date.

Kansas Associated Garden Clubs Fall Meeting

The KAGC Fall Board Hybrid Meeting was called to order by President, Penny Morgan in her conference room at 1:40 after the ZOOM connections with several members. (Half on ZOOM and half present).

The minutes from the last meeting at the June KAGC Convention were printed in the Kansas Gardener. There were no corrections; motion to approve by Floanna Crowley, seconded and approved.

The Treasurer's report was emailed to the board in advance by Treasurer, Margaret Endecott. She then went over the report. A question was raised about her entry for credit card service of \$9.00 per month. This was corrected to read the charge for the KAGC web site, IONAS. The KAGC Judges Council money was listed as a line item. Treasurer's report was then approved with corrections and filed for review.

Margaret reported that the Intrust Bank is requiring that the KAGC President and Secretary's names be added to the signature card. Intrust Banks are located in Topeka for President Penny and in Wichita for Secretary Carolyn Hartman. Each can go to their location bank to sign the card.

Margaret asked about the security bond for the treasurer. Penny informed her to check past records and get it renewed. It had previously been with Travelers with an annual renewal.

Old Business:

Penny has been informed that the East Central District has dis-banned effective December 31, 2025. The clubs voted to split the balance, \$2,596.68, in their account with both remaining clubs.

Club Reports:

Reports were sent in by Garden City Garden Club and Suburban Garden Club. Penny read the report from Garden City and because of the length of the Suburban report, it will be posted in the next Kansas Gardener.

Chairman Reports:

Sherryl Fitzpatrick, Membership Chairman, report emphasized the decline in members. These numbers were all listed in the program at the KAGC Convention – 110 active members and 5 at large.

Sherryl, as Chairman of the June KAGC Convention, gave the final report of finances. The convention costs went over the intake by \$413.03 mainly because Botanica charged a discounted amount of \$480 for room rental. This overage was received from the Sunflower District account which was set up for this purpose.

Kansas Associated Garden Clubs Fall Meeting

Discussion followed concerning the dis-banning of the Sunflower District. It was decided that Penny would contact each club president of the Sunflower District to vote on how the remaining money was to be handled. It is currently a Cashier's check from the Hays Bank.

Kay Catlin, Blue Star Chairman, announced that she has tried to find the Kansas markers and hasn't been able to find any. Discussion was that there was one in Arkansas City, Philson, Solomon and Junction City.

New Business:

Announcement was made of the death of Caroline Wittman. (She served two terms as KAGC President: 2005-2009). A notice will be placed in the next *Kansas Gardener*.

Heather McCain, editor of the *Kansas Gardener* announced that the deadline for the next edition will be December 15, 2025.

Penny announced a special program of NGC asking clubs to plant red, white, and blue flowers next year for the country's 250th anniversary, especially around Blue Star memorials. Clubs can check with NGC for possible funding. She asked that each club promote this project. For more information, Penny announced that she would send the link for the *NGC Gardner* to each club president. The Plant America project for 2026 is a project worth checking. NGC is also giving prize money for outstanding projects.

The 2025 Club President's Reports are due November 1-15, 2025.

The 2026 Convention was discussed. Club Presidents are to bring it to their clubs and ask for suggestions for location and time. A flower show was also discussed.

Beth discussed the Rose Book, which she had digitized a few years ago with a grant, will be retrieved from Caroline's and delivered to the Kansas Historical Society in Topeka.

With no other new business, the meeting was adjourned at 3:10; motion by Heather and approved.

Innovative Approaches Inspire Greater Enthusiasm For Gardening

The Evolution of Gardening Methods

Gardening has undergone significant changes over the years, welcoming a variety of new techniques and tools that make the activity more accessible and rewarding. A key advancement is the widespread use of seed packets. These packets offer gardeners clear, practical instructions for planting seeds, whether in traditional garden plots or larger field settings. Information such as recommended planting depth, proper spacing, and ongoing care serves as a foundation for successful gardening, helping individuals achieve the best possible results.

Structured Garden Beds and Creative Design

Alongside the helpful guidance from seed packets, the trend toward structured garden beds has become increasingly prevalent. These beds are available in various sizes and shapes, providing flexibility for garden design and maintenance. Organizing plants within structured beds allows gardeners to exert greater control over layouts, encouraging creativity and simplifying the management of different plant types. This approach not only enhances the garden's appearance but also fosters greater enthusiasm for gardening.

Optimizing Garden Beds

To make the best use of available space, gardeners are encouraged to plant additional seeds in open areas, reducing the likelihood of weeds taking hold. A strategic arrangement—placing larger plants in the center, medium-sized plants on either side, and smaller plants or root crops along the ends or edges—ensures that every part of the bed is used efficiently. This organization supports a healthy, productive garden environment.

Gardeners are also experimenting with innovative methods such as vertical gardening and raised bed systems to maximize limited space and improve soil conditions. These approaches help boost yields, reduce weed pressure, and provide easier access for planting and harvesting. By combining modern techniques with time-tested traditions, gardening becomes both efficient and enjoyable, appealing to enthusiasts of all skill levels.

Companion Planting and Pollinator Attraction

Companion planting is a valuable technique, involving the cultivation of different plant types together to benefit one another. By interspersing flowers among vegetable crops, gardeners can attract pollinators and helpful insects. These beneficial visitors play a vital role in supporting the health and productivity of garden plants, contributing to gardening success.

Saving Seeds for Future Gardens

As fall arrives, gardeners begin saving seeds for the following year. Seeds are carefully dried and stored in envelopes or empty prescription bottles to preserve them until needed. This practice ensures gardeners are well-prepared for the next planting season and supports the ongoing cycle of growth and renewal in the garden.

Creative Winter Projects for Spring Gardens

Fall also offers opportunities for creative gardening projects. Discovering unique items at estate sales, flea markets, craft shows, and garage sales can inspire projects that refresh gardens for spring, whether designing a cottage garden, balcony, kitchen garden, or patio. Planting bulbs now will ensure early spring showing; while making and painting bird houses may provide shelter and places to raise their young for garden birds. As you remove the annual plants from the garden beds, or planters to get them ready for the winter months, remember to pull plants and weeds from the roots, rake the area well, then apply layers of fall leaves over the bed or planter as nature's blanket of warmth for the soil. As leaves decompose, they return nutrients to the soil; in spring, just add compost or organic fertilizer to prepare for planting.

During the winter months, gardeners often plan layouts, research plant choices, and sort seeds indoors. Serious gardeners plan winter seed starting and create schedules as part of fall preparations. Making plant markers or decorating indoor planters helps keep gardening enjoyable and productive until outdoor work resumes. What new things will you bring to your happy place in the garden?

Suburban Garden Club Report


