Since I joined my garden club three years ago, I have gained so much by volunteering within my club and

at the district and state levels. By taking advantage of the educational opportunities offered by NGC, my passion for gardening and caring for our environment has grown tremendously. I've built friendships in other clubs and other states. I've received so much more than I have given. The knowledge, experiences and friendships I've gained by actively participating and volunteering a little of my time are immense. I hope you will consider actively participating and volunteering in your club as well as at the district and state levels. Embrace the opportunities you are presented with.

I hope your harvest was plentiful this fall and I look forward to meeting you in the future.

From the Editors

My Dear Fellow Gardeners,

Declining membership is something that concerns most clubs in CFGC and CFGC itself. We are not alone. Declining membership is a problem facing most organizations from churches to professional groups to social clubs and this has been the case for decades. Younger folks just aren't joiners. Whether they object to the "formality" or "rules" of paying dues, showing up at meetings, taking your turn at holding office, or whether they simply don't see the point, they tend not to join. Social interaction takes place in bars, fitness centers, and to a limited degree, coffee shops and social media.

Organizations that had a lot of female members started declining when more women started working outside the home. They simply weren't available for daytime meetings and evenings had to be spent doing other things.

While professional groups and service clubs were important for networking and developing relationships, that importance declined as businesses became more global, de-emphasizing local contacts. Businesses started to require more overtime, and no longer saw any benefit to allowing employees a long lunch hour to attend the Rotary Club or the Optimists. Studies show that young folks, in their thirties and younger, have fewer friends than previous generations, and lack social skills to form relationships, skills formed in organiza-

tions.

But I think things will be turning around, soon. Covid put a lot of people in isolation and demonstrated the value of clubs and organizations. If you wanted to talk to people, you had to organize an online meeting for a specific time, and not rely on running into someone at the gym. People got used to new ways of meeting. People started taking up constructive projects and hobbies, like gardening, and needed information and moral support, and started looking for groups to supply them. Oddly enough, I think the decline in broadcast television will also start people looking for things to do, groups to join, in their free time.

The pendulum will start swinging the other way, and the key for garden clubs is to not mess it up. Some things I've learned from other organizations facing declines in membership are these:

- 1) Be welcoming. Talk to visitors and newcomers. Don't spend all your time visiting with your old friends in the club.
- 2) Be open to people who are ...well, the vast majority of CFGC members are pale and female.

Think about what that means in terms of expanding membership. Our club had to change its bylaws a couple of decades ago to allow men to join. On the other hand, I've often thought Pueblo could use a Men's Garden Club. So let's be open to men's clubs, ladies' clubs, couples's clubs, coed clubs, and the neighbor down the street with the cute accent.

- 3) Be clear about your purpose. Ours is educating people about, and sharing the joys of gardening.

Let's all look forward to a wonderful year in 2026!

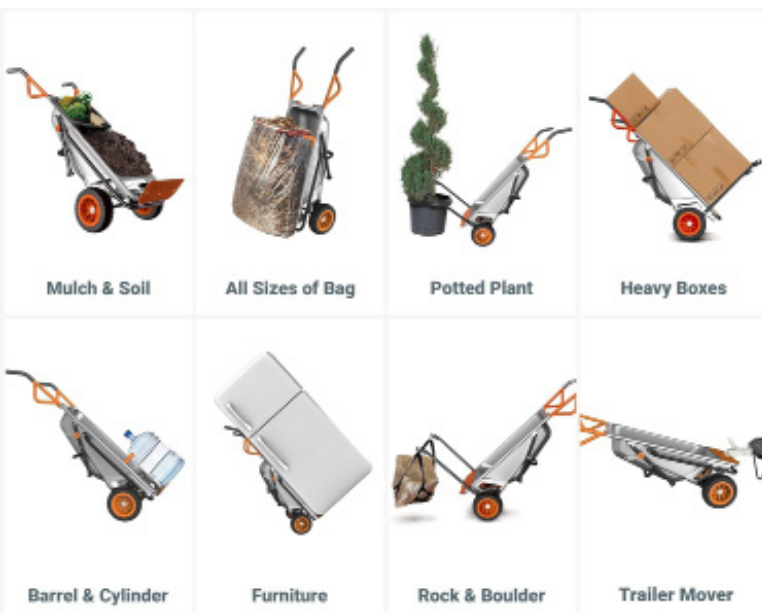

Culinary Corner

Summer is over and the bounty of the harvest is upon us. If you still have some good-sized zucchini on hand, here is a way to enjoy them in a unique way, stuffed.

Ingredients:

2 ea	Zucchini Squash, 9" long
1 ea	Italian Sausage, mild
8 oz	Soft Mozzarella or Provolone
1/3 Cup	Pine Nuts or Slivered Almonds
1 Can	Diced Tomato, drained
2 Cloves	Garlic, minced
1/2 Cup	Basil Leaves, fresh, minced
	Olive Oil
	Lemon Juice
	Salt
	Pepper

Directions:

Works best in a good toaster oven.

[1] Heat oven to 400°F.

[2] Toast the nuts for a few minutes, until they are lightly browned. DO NOT OVER COOK. Then remove and

cool before they overcook.

[3] Slice zucchini lengthwise into halves.

[4] Scoop out seeds and flesh of zucchini, leaving at least 1/2" of flesh on each side.

[5] In a cake pan of proper size, drizzle olive oil in pan.

[6] Place zucchini halves in the pan, cut side up. Drizzled with olive oil. Salt and Pepper.

[6] Bake in the oven for 15 minutes, until flesh is soft and skins are crisp.

[7] Meanwhile, split open the sausage, scoop out the meat and fry in skillet until cooked.

[8] Combine the meat, nuts, cheese, tomato, basil, lemon juice and garlic in a bowl. Mix thoroughly.

[9] Take the zucchini from the oven and let cool.

[10] Stuff the zucchini halves with the mixed ingredients.

[11] Drizzle the stuffed zucchini with olive oil and put back in oven, cooking for 25 minutes.

[12] Serve on a bed of cooked rice or pasta with marinara sauce.

Colorado Federation of Garden Clubs Board Meeting

September 5, 2025

Zoom meeting

The meeting was called to order by Pat Smit at 1:07 pm.

Since there were only 10 members present, there was no quorum for doing business.

Pat presented the minutes from the June meeting. There were no changes or additions to the minutes. After discussion it was determined that a motion was not necessary, and the minutes could be approved as submitted.

Treasurers report was given at an earlier meeting. Since Margie Soileau, the treasurer, had to leave early, Pat reviewed the written treasurer's report with the board. Highlights of the report are that we receive income each month of over \$2000 from the sale of Emerson House. We have received \$6287 between June 1, 2025, and August 24, 2025. Other income has come from dues, donations, and investments. At present there is approximately \$31,000 in the checking account.

There are several items in the budget are under consideration to be observed into other budget lines: butterfly, garden therapy, and garden tours

Jeanne Ricci-Poiry is the secretary pro temp until the board has a quorum to vote on the appointment. There was discussion about the hosting of district meetings. Northern District has a dilemma because the Dig and Dream Garden Club has voted not to host even though it's their turn. Northern District is looking at other possibilities.

Pat Smit mentioned that there is a need to update the Standing Rules and Procedures to include how to handle a situation like the present one.

Scholarships

An applicant for a scholarship was rejected because of attending an out of state school. The website had different information. The Scholarship Committee needs to reevaluate because of the misinformation.

The Garden and Home Show Foundation has been sold. By participating in the annual event CFGC has been fortunate enough to be granted \$5000 for educational purposes. The new company is Market Place Events. Pat Smit and Stacy Shockley negotiated with the company to try to get the same opportunities. It seems we will be able to apply for the grant as usual. If CFGC participates we would have to pay for electricity. Pat thinks we would not need to have electricity.

Another consideration would be to participate in the fall garden show instead of February when the weather can be bad.

Stacy and Pat participated at the fall show in a booth, "Ask a Gardener" since they had negotiated so fiercely for continued support from the organization. Pat has applied for the \$5000 grant since she and Stacy participated in the fall show.

Doris Duckworth has written the grant applications for 20 years and has turned in her materials and wants to be relieved of that position.

Pat reported that NGC has a new website and is having challenges. They are working slowly to improve it. The members' section does have many resources. Victoria Schmidt will be the editor of the NGC newsletter.

CFGC Calendar: Pat will show club presidents or district presidents how to add information to the calendar.

Technology: A new laptop was purchased for the treasurer. Margie preferred to use her own computer. Debbie Martin needed one to use for her work as district president. She is borrowing it currently.

Ways and Means: Stacy reported that since there is not a quorum, recommendations from Ways and Means Committee will be presented in December if there is a quorum at that time.



- Northern Front Range: Debbie Martin reported that Dig and Dream has decided not to host the northern district annual meeting. Debbie is working on an alternative plan since it was Dig and Dream's turn to host.
- Southern District: Sandy Bateman said the accommodations for the southern district annual meeting are almost settled and plans are underway.
- Western and Southwestern Districts did not attend.
- Flower Show: Audrey Coyle announced the September flower show will be at the Black Forest Lodge on September 12, 2025, from 11:00 am to 12:30 pm.

Unfinished Business:

- Membership Report: Sue Parker reported that Evergreen has disbanded, Denver Mile High Club meets in the evenings, and Berthoud, Colorado, might be a possible new club.
- Stacy Shockley, 1st VP, is working on the CFGC website.
- Pat Smit, President, reminded club presidents, committee chairs, district presidents to contact her with information to put on the calendar.
- NGC classes can be found on the NGC website under the Education tab. Some zoom classes might be more helpful for our area.
- Chuck Peltó reminded us of the deadline for the Garden Connection is September 19, 2025.
